Seven times a day I praise you because your judgements are righteous (Psalm 119:164).


To sanctify the day and all human activity. - General Instruction of the Liturgy of the Hours

THE CARDINAL VIRTUES

We are called to model virtue in our lives. Four virtues play a pivotal role and accordingly are called "cardinal"; all the others are grouped around them (CCC 1805). The four cardinal virtues are prudence, justice, temperance, and fortitude (Wis 8:7). These four and all other virtues revolve around love. By charity, we love God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves for love of God. Charity, the form of all the virtues, "binds everything together in perfect harmony" (CCC 1844 [Col 3:14]).

THE PSALMS ARE INSTRUCTIONS FOR WALKING WITH GOD

The Psalms guide us in the path of love as we learn to practice virtue—love in action. The Psalms may be seen as the prayer book of the Bible.
